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In Room 9, to begin our maths this year, we have started by looking at chance and the probability of something happening. We have played a bunch of games both inside and outside involving chance and changing parts of the game to see how it changed the chance of something happening making it either harder or easier.

The class have also enjoyed playing a game called Roll to Create a Creature, where they rolled a dice six times and had to draw the body, eyes, mouth, arms, legs and extra features that corresponded to the number they rolled each time giving them 36 different options. They played and drew different monsters numerous times all the while thinking about the chances of them sharing features with their previous monsters or someone else's. unsurprisingly no two monsters were exactly the same (but not impossible!) and while some shared perhaps one or two things the same they were very different each time and from each other. Students were able to identity these chances and use the language of certain, likely, possible, unlikely and impossible. They also played the classic chance game of Snakes and Ladders and quickly saw how their luck and fortunes could change very quickly realising when it comes to chance it is skill based, sometimes its complete luck - or a combination of the two.
